

Signed by Snyder on title page.


Designed and edited by Cid Corman for his Origin Press. Snyder is an important literary figure whose work remains extremely relevant to this day. Snyder has been dubbed the Poet Laureate of Deep Ecology.


2 - Jack Kerouac.

Four small tape stains on the free endsheets. There is a tiny numerical notation in pen on the top edge of the front free endsheet. 
Lew Welch was an active participant in Beat culture, and lived at various times with Gary Snyder and Lawrence Ferlinghetti.

The Beard.



The photographs measure 3 1/2 x 2 1/2" and 5 x 3 1/2", and show 4 different images of McClure in a natural setting with friends, practicing shooting. [50241] **\$125**


The true first edition of this work. Copyright page reads: "...for actors and friends of the author only..." An underground theater classic. Not only was McClure associated with the San Francisco renaissance of the mid 1950s, but later he played a part in the poet's theater movement that was revived in San Francisco in the 1980s.

5 - Lawrence Ferlinghetti.

One Thousand Fearful Words for Fidel Castro. San Francisco: A City Lights Publication, 1961. Thin duodecimo [19 cm] Folded black and white printed broadside poem. There is a 1/4 inch long closed tear along one of the folds. [34129] **\$125**

Signed by Ferlinghetti on the rear wrap below the price. Lawrence Ferlinghetti is an American poet, painter, and liberal activist. He is the co-founder of City Lights Booksellers & Publishers.





7 - William S. Burroughs; Brion Gysin.

The Third Mind.

New York: The Viking Press, 1978. First edition. 194pp. Octavo [21.5 cm] in boards over cloth spine. Very light wear to price-clipped jacket; slight rubbing to boards at extremities; interior is clean and bright. [47221] **\$350**

Signed by Burroughs on half-title.


Burroughs and Gysin explore the "cut-up" method of making meaning, in which language is snipped and shuffled into new forms.


8 - Allen Ginsberg.

Signed and inscribed by Ginsberg on title page. Contains the anti-war poem "Wichita Vortex Sutra," and "Death News," Ginsberg's poetic reaction to hearing of the death of William Carlos Williams.

The Joe 82 Creation Poems.

Los Angeles: Black Sparrow Press, 1974. Limited Edition. 136pp. Octavo [23.5 cm] 1/4 black cloth with yellow paper over boards printed in black, brown and red. The top edge of the rear board is subtly sunned, and the rear cover is just a bit discolored. There are a couple of minor bumps along the bottom edge of the front cover. [39541] **\$60**






A classic "chapbook" style publication from Tom Russell. Number 222 in a limited edition of unspecified number.



Contains an interview with Allen Ginsberg, in which he discusses music and spoken word, specifically his time spent in Bob Dylan's Rolling Thunder Review [Revue]. Also includes contributions by Denise Levertov, David Meltzer, Margaret Atwood, Anne Waldman, and James Dickey. In this anthology, the poets reveal how they approach and think about poetry readings themselves. Contains numerous illustrations.




14 - Denise Levertov.



Mishaps, Perhaps.



This is the author's first book. Signed, "Best, Carl Solomon" on the title page. Carl Solomon was the dedicatee of Howl. In the Introduction to Howl, William Carlos Williams states, with regards to Ginsberg, "Now he turns up fifteen or twenty years later with an arresting poem. Literally he has, from all evidence, been through hell. On the way he met a man named Carl Solomon with whom he shared among the teeth and excrement of this life something that cannot be described but in the words he has used to describe it."
