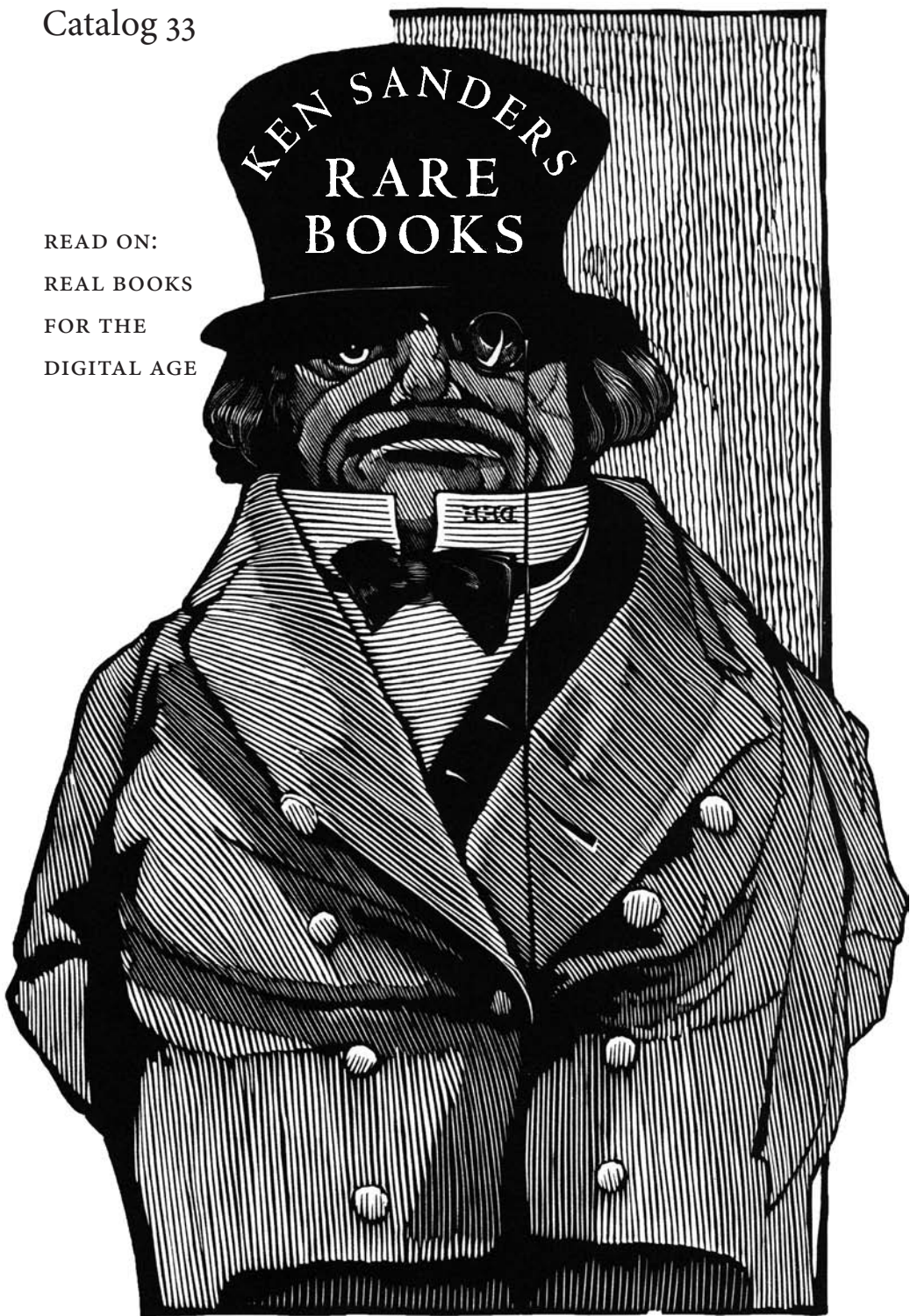

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READ ON: REAL BOOKS FOR THE DIGITAL AGE

As we head into prime weather for curling up by the fire with a good book, it seems like a good time to worry about whether there will still be any real books to curl up with in the future. I am hardly the first to wonder whether we're heading for a post-print world (Sherman Alexie and Umberto Eco, among many others, have had some interesting things to say about the digitization of books), but it nonetheless seems worthwhile to add something to the debate about real books in our digital age. This catalog is that something. It's my way of showing, through the books included in this list, the reasons real books are important in all kinds of ways to all kinds of people. This list reflects my own specific point of view as a voracious consumer of print and as an independent bookseller. By illustrating my ideas about the significance of real books using examples from our shop, I am hoping not to produce in others the same passion for the same books I love, but instead to incite thought about the place of physical books in our lives.

Firstly, I will acknowledge that I own an ebook reader. This is not a confession (there is not, so far as I know, an independent booksellers Committee of Affairs out there waiting to arrest me for betraying the cause, and if there is, they haven't caught me yet), and I do not believe that digital books represent the end of printed books. I consider digital books just as valid as physically printed books and am happy to admit that there are some ways in which ebooks are better than their physical counterparts. The thing is, though, that ebooks and physical books are not the same. The differences between ebooks and "real" books—the kind of real books in this catalog, the kind that have seen the business end of a printing press, the kind that don't run on batteries—are important because it is within those differences that we can see why real books matter.

The difference between digital and physical book formats is deceptively simple: one is electronic and comes on a screen; the other is physical and often appears as printed text between two covers. For a difference that is so easy to identify, it has implications that can be difficult to pin down.

For instance, does our experience with books and reading bear any relationship to the form they come in? Would my memories of reading Harper Lee's novel *To Kill a Mockingbird* be different if I'd read it on a screen for the first time? Are there cognitive differences in the ways that we acquire a text, process it, and interact with it that depend upon the form of the book? What kinds of influences are exerted on our readings by physical book elements such as the paper they are printed on, the way they smell, the color of their bindings, the design and illustration of their dust jackets? What about kinesthetics? Do the physical movements we make when we read books, such as page turning, dog-earing, and note-taking, influence on our interaction with them? Until we've scratched our way deeper than the surface of these kinds of questions, I am reluctant to believe that we interact with ebooks in the same way that we experience real books.

Dust jackets present an interesting way to look at another aspect of the difference between digital books and physical books: browsing and marketing. Take, for instance, R. Crumb's outstanding dust jacket art for the tenth anniversary edition of Edward Abbey's *The Monkey Wrench Gang* (item number 95 in this catalog). The art is perfectly suited to the book, and enhances our ability to imagine Hayduke and the other members of the gang out monkeywrenching. Now imagine the way that you go into a bookshop and browse through the books, picking some up, and putting others down. Chances are that some of your decisions about what books to buy are based on the way they are presented by the jacket. But there is no dust in ebookland, and thus no need for dust jackets and their cover art. Despite that old adage about judging books by their covers, I love dust jackets. I love the information they provide about the books they cover, and I love the way that they collectively record more than a hundred years of trends in commercial design and marketing.

Real books are browse-able in ways that ebooks are not, which works in their favor in terms of searching and nostalgia (Sure, you can browse ebooks, but it just isn't the same). Maybe there's a book you dimly remember from childhood, or have forgotten about entirely until you happen across it in a bookstore. For me, one of those dimly remembered things is Jan Pienkowski's seriously fun pop-up book *Haunted House* (item 27), and I was overjoyed to find it again at a recent bookfair. The excitement of hunting for books like that is part of why I go to bookstores, and the thrill of finding a thing I didn't know I was looking for evokes the best kind of nostalgia.

The visual elements of real books like dust jackets call to mind the fact that despite great progress in ebook technology, digital books currently can't hold a candle to real books in aesthetic terms. Books are more than word-driven informational texts, they are a sensory experience, a field where ideas about form and representation can be played with, subverted, and communicated. For example, Berni Wrightson's fantastical seventies color-the-creature book (item 54), could not exist in an ebook form with the current limitations of that form.

In fact, a sizable portion of this catalog just doesn't translate into ebook terms—items 1-89, in various ways, demonstrate the strength of real books in visual and sensory terms. These are books that need to be seen and handled to believe. I hope you'll come visit them at our bookstore, or at the upcoming bookfairs in San Francisco and Boston (see the terms page for more information on the fairs).

Real books don't only record shifts in commercial design; they also serve in other important historical capacities. They represent a kind of permanence in the face of oppositional forces like time, natural disasters, politics, and litigation. Timewise, real books still have an edge over ebooks as a storage medium. Books, even those printed on acidic paper, have a lifespan exceeding that of magnetic supports. Copies of the first books to come off Gutenberg's mechanical printing press are still around more than 500 years after they were printed. By way of contrast, have you checked the sell-by date on your digital storage devices lately?

Many important books would not exist today if it weren't for the comparative difficulty of destroying all copies of a printed work. *The Book of Commandments* (item 157), one of the doctrinal works of the Mormon Church, was only partially printed when the print shop was destroyed by an angry anti-Mormon mob in 1833. The survival of this historical work is the result of individual sheets of paper being salvaged from the wreckage.

Allen Ginsberg's "Howl" (item 116) is one of the most influential works of the Beat Generation, and has gone on to become part of the cultural landscape, but it wasn't always so widely appreciated. The poem was initially considered obscene, and copies of the controversial work were seized. Its survival is at least partly due to its status as a physical book. Consider the practical differences involved in banning a real book and banning an ebook—it is much harder to find and confiscate hundreds or thousands or millions of physical copies of a book than it is to virtually seize the same text when it is stored on a digital device with built-in Internet capability.

Similarly, preservation of textual changes that occur as the result of things like litigation are more stable when they are preserved in real books. Again, it is vastly easier to make challenged text disappear when it exists only in digital format. Ken Kesey's *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* (item 119), another of the Beat Generation's greatest works, is not now the same text it was upon publication in 1962. The text that appears in every copy except the first few printings is not the text as Kesey originally wrote it. Kesey and his publisher were sued by a woman who claimed that one of the characters was based on her and that the characterization was defamatory. Due to the lawsuit, Kesey re-wrote several passages, and as a result the vast majority of people who have read *Cuckoo's Nest* have not read the real thing. If you want to read it the way it was written, the way the author intended it, you have to get your hands on one of the first printings. We will have an early printing with the original text available at the Golden Gate Park Book Fair.

The physicality of books also lends itself to differentiation; while every digital copy of a book is exactly the same as all the others, every copy of a real book acquires its own unique history. As time passes, each hard copy of a book diverges from all the other copies of the same book—maybe one copy passes through many hands, maybe one is splashed by morning coffee, and so on. The point is that the copies become discrete entities with individual histories and characteristics. This individuality results in books that are deeply personal, such as association copies and signed books. Our copy of Ed Leuders's neglected classic of nature writing, *The Clam Lake Papers* (item 121), has for instance passed through the hands of naturalist Terry Tempest Williams and bears her gift inscription. Sherman Alexie's poetry book, *Dangerous Astronomy* (item 64), is for one thing not available as an ebook, and is for another signed by the author. Even if the book were available in digital format, try getting Alexie to sign your ebook device sometime and see what happens.

The tangible nature of real books is important in terms of community and public access. Sharing and lending are key elements of participating in a community of readers, yet the current price-point of ebook readers makes it impractical to lend out ebooks, and there is also the problem that if you lend out one ebook, you are in effect lending out all of your ebooks since they're all stored in the same place. Although this will no doubt change, the relatively high cost of ebook readers makes them luxury devices that tend to exclude people with limited means and those with limited or nonexistent access to electricity. And make no mistake, the mass digitization of texts that are being made available online is not the same thing as a publicly accessible library, or even the same thing as a bookstore. Real library books are free and available to anyone with a library card, and the library itself is a comparatively non-commercial space.

Bookstores as real book spaces are particularly valuable in comparison with digital bookstores and digital libraries because they are a physical and ideological space for people to interact with books and with each other and also because they are generally run by book people. Our store alone hosts dozens of book events each year that are free and open to the public. Our store and staff are a source of information and knowledge exchange—you won't find an expert on western travel and exploration like our store's founder Ken Sanders available to talk with you at the virtual checkout counter. Come see us, and I guarantee we can introduce you to something new and cool that you might not otherwise find, like Anne Bachelier's inspired interpretation of *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* (items 15 and 16). Our business is rooted in our community, and another strength of the real-book store model is regionalism—we know and interact with all kinds of regional people and issues, and that is why we have Utah artist Edward Bateman's luminous digital photo-art book *Mechanical Brides of the Uncanny* (item 1) and you don't (yet). Independent bookstores with real books, like ours, provide a vital counterpoint to the sameness of chain stores, bestseller lists and the limitations of ebooks. But as things stand right now, the voice of

independent bookselling is threatened by a digital marketplace from which we are excluded.

As a last note about the importance of real books, keep in mind that a real book doesn't need to be plugged in. Sometimes it's good to unplug from an increasingly digitized society, and curl up outside the electronic glow of modern life.

Finally, although ebooks and real books have their differences, they are ultimately both forms of the book. It's too simple to say that the new technology will overtake the old, especially when both are based on the much older technology of the alphabet. The alphabet isn't going anywhere, and neither are real books.

Mechanical Brides of the Uncanny: The Automatons of Edward Bateman.

Nazraeli Press, 2009. A collection of works that conflate the past and present in the form of cartes-de-visite featuring automatons strangely at ease in their turn of the century settings. The book was limited to an edition of 500 copies, each of which feature 12 four-color plates and include one original cdv print. Hardcover. As New.

In *Mechanical Brides of the Uncanny*, artist Edward Bateman creates images that explore photography's role as historical evidence. Presented as a collection of discovered cartes-de-visite, this book documents a forgotten age of mechanical wonders. Cartes-de-visite were an immensely popular form of photography in the last half of the nineteenth century. They were widely traded and collected, with subjects ranging from portraits of everyday people to those of luminaries. Bateman uses this history to question the idea that all photographs are bound to a particular moment in time. Combining 19th century imagery with fabricated automatons, he creates images of the past with an iconography that is usually used to depict the future. They invite a comparison between automatons and cameras; for the first time in human history, objects of our creation were looking back at us. He imagines an era where memory and change marched hand in hand, creating the world we live in today and leaving behind worlds that only exist in images.

Immigration has become one of the most important and contentious issues of our time. But even as policy makers in the United States and Mexico argue over what to do about the half million or more Mexicans who cross the border illegally each year to work in the United States, one fact has become indisputable. Illegal immigration has enhanced the lives of poor people more than any policy attempted by either the U.S. or the Mexican governments. Immigrants sent home \$23 billion dollars in 2006 alone, rivaling what Mexico earned from selling oil. But the human cost of migration is equally high. Border crossers risk injury, attack, rape, and death, while undocumented workers often toil under dangerous and exploitative conditions in the United States.

These harsh realities constitute the heart of *Exodus/Éxodo*, a powerful collaboration between writer Charles Bowden and photographer Julián Cardona that puts a human face on the issue of illegal immigration.

Expanding on their award-winning 2006 *Mother Jones* article titled "Exodus: Border-Crossers Forge a New America," Bowden and Cardona take us to border towns, in which impoverished men and women hire "coyotes" to get them across the line; to Ciudad Juárez, where hundreds of young women maquiladora workers have been murdered and their families still seek justice; to Minutemen camps along the border, where citizen vigilantes keep watch; to New Orleans, North Carolina, and California, where migrants find back-breaking work in construction, agriculture, and other industries; to protest marches, as immigrants assert their right to stay in the United States; and to villages in Mexico, in which remitted dollars are building homes as lavish as the dreams that fuel the migrations. Over a three year period Sanders pursued and unraveled some perplexing and bold book thefts that had begun in the San Francisco Bay area, but soon spread across the country; thefts often targeting members of the ABAA and involving the loss of such valuable and rare first editions as John Steinbeck's *The Grapes of Wrath*, Jack Kerouac's *On the Road* and Thomas Hardy's *The Mayor of Castleridge*, among many others.

These antiquarian book thefts by a then unknown bay area thief quickly soared into the tens and hundreds of thousands of dollars and went on for a period of years. With the help of his fellow booksellers and an unusual cop that took book theft seriously, Sanders, the self-professed biblio-detective, cracked the case and exposed the book thief, one John Charles Gilkey, "The Man Who Loved to Steal Books Too Much" and sent him to San Quentin for three years.

Journalist Allison Bartlett became fascinated with this case and the book thief and the book detective and has now written a full-length book about the dark side of the antiquarian book trade: *The Man Who Loved Books Too Much*.

“With the prospects of a Mormon press came the possibility of printing Joseph Smith’s revelation and making them more widely available to the members of the Church. At a conference in Hiram, Ohio, in November 1831, it was resolved to print the revelations in book form under the title Book of Commandments in an edition of 10, 000. Five months later, when Joseph Smith, Sidney Rigdon, and other journeyed to Independence with paper for the new Mormon press, the size of the edition was reduced to 3000. Five signatures comprising 160 pages had been printed when the printing shop was destroyed on July 20, 1833 by an angry anti-Mormon mob. Sheets of the unfinished book were salvaged from the wreckage of the shop; some were collected as they blew about the streets of Independence. From these sheets a few copies of the Book of Commandments were assembled. Twenty-nine copies have surfaced in 176 years, most in home-made bindings—a reflection of the salvaged nature of the book. The title page occurs in two states, with and without an ornamental border.

Just what the completed Book of Commandments would have contained is a matter of conjecture. Considering those revelations published earlier in the Star

and those published subsequently in the Doctrine and Covenants, it would appear that the completed book would have contained at least one and possibly two additional signatures.” —Peter Crawley.

This atlas contains the three stunning panoramas, 'From Point Sublime in the Kaibab,' by William H. Holmes. These three panoramas offer a 270 degree view of the Grand Canyon. This atlas also contains Thomas Moran's exquisite work, 'The Transept, Kaibab Division, Grand Cañon An Amphitheater of the Sec-

ond Order.' These four plates have made this work one of the most sought after Western Americana titles, and are usually missing from this monumental work.

In 1875, Clarence Edward Dutton (1841–1912) joined the United States Geological Survey and is known for his extensive explorations of the Rocky Mountain region. His greatest accomplishment is his *Tertiary History of the Grand Canon District of 1882*. It is still considered the preeminent work on the Grand Canyon to date. The atlas is beautifully illustrated with maps and views engraved by Julius Bien. Sheet XVIII of the atlas, entitled "The Transept, Kaibab Division, Grand Canyon" is based on the immense painting of the same title by artist Thomas Moran (1837–1926). Moran, more than any other artist, is most closely associated with images of the Grand Canyon. The field artist for the Dutton geological exploration was William Henry Holmes (1846–1933). Holmes was most noted for his sense of realism and accurate draftsmanship. Holmes contributed many finely executed panoramic views of the Grand Canyon to the Atlas that are quite stunning. He exhibited at the National Academy of Design, The Art Institute of Chicago and The Brooklyn Art Club among others. Holmes later held positions as Curator at the University of Chicago (1898–1906) and was a former Director of the National Academy of Design (1920–1932). Farquhar states: "One of the greatest, if not the very greatest of all Grand Canyon books. The atlas, containing the superb panoramic views by William H. Holmes and a drawing by Thomas Moran, is a rich portfolio of art as well as a collection of maps and an exposition of geology." Farquhar 73.

Also, bound in is the David Dale Owen report: *Geological Exploration of part of Iowa, Wisconsin, and Illinois, made under Instructions from the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, In the Autumn of the Year 1839*. Three of the fold out plates, and the fold-out map are hand tinted.

John Fremont's expeditions of 1842 and 1843–44 were the most spectacular reconnaissance of the American West since Lewis and Clark. Performed under the auspices of the Army Bureau of Topographical Engineers, the expedition's published reports and maps brought a factor of dependability and trustworthi-

ness that would aid American settlement of the West. Important work on the exploration of the west, with the hard-to-find map. Fremont's report and the accompanying Preuss map were the most detailed observations and maps of the western territories at the time. The country covered by the report was previously terra incognita. Brigham Young is said to have used both the report and the map as a guide in bringing the Mormon people West. Utah was then part of Mexico and would first become Deseret and then Utah territory.
