

The text block is cracked here and there, however the book is still quite sturdy. Good. [55374] \$30

An account of a journey to Australia via the California gold mines.

2. Beerbohm, Max. **Seven Men**. New York: Alfred A. Knopf, 1920. First American edition. 400pp. Large octavo [23 cm] Black cloth over boards, with glue staining along the top and fore-edges of the rear board. The text block is cracked at p. 161. Good. [55442] \$20

The first American edition of Seven Men, containing an appendix and six drawings not published elsewhere, and consisting of two thousand copies of which this is number 257.

One in an edition limited to six hundred and seventy copies, of which six hundred and fifty are for sale. Signed by the author on the limitation page.

Introduction by David Hannay. A weird story of a "flying Dutchman." The story also contains an often reprinted werewolf episode, "The Story of the Hartz Mountains."


In the title story, the main character is given a glimpse of the afterlife.
