



The edges of the covers are gently rubbed and bumped. There are a couple of short closed tears in the spine ends. The text block is cracked at p. 487. The pages are very mildly browned.


Includes Major J. W. Powell's, The Canons of the Colorado, beginning on p. 293. In 1869, ten men in four boats embarked on a journey that would cover almost 1,000 miles through uncharted canyons and change the west forever. Three months later only five of the original company plus the one-armed Civil War hero leader, John Wesley Powell, would return from the depths of the Grand Canyon at the mouth of the Virgin River. Major John Wesley Powell was 35 years old when led the expedition.



483pp. Thick octavo [20.5 cm] Light purple cloth covered boards with gilt stamped titles and decorative patterns on the spine and covers. All edges gilt. Ex-library. The spine is very heavily faded. The covers are rubbed, and the edges of the covers are subtly faded and bumped. A previous owner's name has been stamped in gilt on the front cover. There are numerous small splits in the cloth at the ends of the spine. There is an abraded patch on the spine, where something has been rubbed out. The gilt on the bottom edge of the text block is slightly rubbed. This once belonged to a county historical library. The front endsheet has a discard label and a couple of ink stamps. The text block is cracked several times, however the book is still very sturdy. The pages are mildly browned. There are a library markings on the Preface page. Pp. 44-45 have large dark patches. One of the rear flyleaves has numerous small light stains.



Thin octavo [22 cm] Dark brown cloth covered boards with blind, black ink and gilt stamped title and decorative designs

on the covers. With alternate sample binding on the front pastedown. The extremities are rubbed and gently bumped. There is a bend in the top left corner of the rear board that measures just under 2 inches long. The spine is faded, and the cloth at the spine ends is a little frayed. The boards are just a tiny bit bowed and barely perceptibly stained. The endsheets and flyleaves are lightly soiled and foxed. The frontispiece, title page, and tissue guard are heavily foxed. Brief pencil notations on the supplied notation pages at the rear.





The wrinkled tissue guard at the frontispiece page is partially detached, and the illustration at p. 67 is just

beginning to detach. The pages are mildly yellowed.

There are losses from the leather at the ends of the spine. The losses measure approximately 1 and 1/4" wide by just under 1/2" deep. The leather boards are a little scratched, and there are two small gauges in the

rear board. There is a previous owner's bookplate on the front pastedown.




## Waters, Frank and Oswald White Bear Fredericks Book of the Hopi

Story of Glen Canyon and Lake Powell National Recreation area, and an early "discovery" of Rainbow National Bridge.



front free endpaper. The author writes, "To\_\_\_\_, with best regards, Richard A. Bartlett."








